HOUSE – STURT STREET

Lot 1 DP 743626 No. 10 Sturt Street, Campbelltown Weatherboard House





HISTORY AND DESCRIPTION:

This is one of several late nineteenth century/early twentieth century houses which are found on the hillside streets of Campbelltown. The houses range in age from approximately 1860 or 1870 (early chimneys and small paned windows) to the first decades of the twentieth century. Several of these houses show details that suggest they were constructed by a single builder.

The house at No. 10 Sturt Street is most likely the oldest cottage of the group, probably constructed around 1870. A small, simple timber workers cottage, with a unusual front window/door layout. Concrete tiles have replaced original roofing material, which was most likely timber shingles. Original brick chimney extant.

CONDITION AND USE:

The cottage shows signs of major alterations - verandah detailing, roof material and façade layout. In use as a dwelling.

HERITAGE SIGNIFICANCE:

- The building has Aesthetic and Group significance
- It is of local significance to Campbelltown because:
 - it represents (with others in the group) the character of Campbelltown when it was an early Australian country town.
 - It is an usual example of early workers cottages
