Purpose

To provide Council with information regarding events and activities for the 16 Days of Action including White Ribbon Day and Stop DV Day 2010.

Report

Since 1999 the 16 Days of Action Campaign has been used as a strategy by individuals and groups around the world to call for the elimination of all forms of violence against women.

The campaign traditionally begins with White Ribbon Day on 25 November, which is the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women. Stop DV Day is celebrated on the first Friday of December each year and is a tribute to the people who have been affected by domestic violence.

White Ribbon Day is an annual event coordinated by men to increase public awareness of domestic violence in the community, with activities aiming to specifically engage males in the cause by asking them to wear a white ribbon showing their support for ending violence against women.

As part of activities to acknowledge Stop DV Day, Council staff have been working with the Benevolent Society through the Campbelltown Domestic Violence Liaison Committee to coordinate a forum for Home and Community Care (HACC) services to raise awareness on the issue of older women experiencing domestic and family violence. The forum will be held on Thursday 2 December 2010 at the Campbelltown Civic Hall.

It also is proposed that on 25 November 2010 males with a high community profile will hand out ribbons in targeted locations such as local railway stations and shopping centres.

Activities to mark White Ribbon Day 2010 will be conducted in partnership between Council, St Vincent de Paul and the Campbelltown Domestic Violence Liaison Committee.

Council has run the Beach Bus to Wollongong Beach since 2003 for young people 12-18 years living, working, or studying in the Campbelltown Local Government Area. This initiative provides young people with free return bus travel to Wollongong Beach on Busways route 887.

It is proposed to run the Beach Bus again in the summer school holidays from Saturday 18 December 2010 to Sunday 23 January 2011. Busways have indicated they would again like to be involved in the Beach Bus program this year.

This year tickets will be distributed from Youth Centres in the Campbelltown Local Government Area as well as Quondong Visitors Information Centre to increase the equity of distribution for local young people.

Due to changes in Busways ticketing system, Council will need to purchase MyZone tickets for young people travelling on the beach bus. These tickets will enable young people to travel on any Busways service to Campbelltown Railway Station and then on Route 887 to Wollongong.

Busways will again offer 50% off fares for young people wanting to use the bus service but who have not obtained the free tickets from Council.

Camden Council has indicated they will again be purchasing Beach Bus tickets from Busways.

Promotional material and final details for the 2010-2011 Beach Bus will be distributed to Councillors when available.

To provide Council with an update on the Minto Community Centre.

History

The new Minto Community Centre was the subject of a briefing to Council on 5 October 2010. The centre forms part of a Development Management Agreement between Campbelltown City Council, Housing NSW, and Landcom for the Minto Renewal Project.

Report

Construction of the Minto Community Centre is due to commence in early February 2011. Landcom is responsible for the project with completion including fit out expected in early 2012.

The centre will be located in Redfern Park, behind Minto Mall and Sarah Redfern Public School. On completion the building will be handed over to Council and bookings will be managed by Council's Customer Service section.

A key objective of the Minto Renewal Project is to facilitate the provision of improved social services and create new opportunities for residents. This would be achieved through developing strong partnerships with government, non-government agencies and community organisations.

It is proposed that a key project operate from the Minto Community Centre for the duration of the Minto Renewal Project. This would ensure that there was a high level of utilisation of the building from the time of its opening.

Housing NSW have written to Council requesting that when the Minto Community Centre is opened the Council consider setting aside an area to allow MTC Work Solutions to deliver learning and employment services. MTC Work Solutions have fulfilled the role of the Minto Learning and Employment Coordination since September 2008. This is currently delivered through the Minto Access Point (MAP). The MAP has an average of 130 attendances per day and 1140 members, seventy percent of which are from Minto.

The presence of a key community service provider would attract other related programs and support the activities of smaller community groups. The remainder of the space of the centre will be available for these groups and bookings would be managed by Council's Customer Service section.

3.1 Edge of Elsewhere 2011

Purpose

To inform Council of stage two developments of the major contemporary arts project Edge of Elsewhere that has been commissioned over three years for Sydney Festival.

History

Council at the meeting of 15 December 2009, Community Services Committee Item 3.2 - Australia Council for the Arts Funding for Sydney Festival Project was informed that Council had received \$300,000 funding over three years from the Visual Arts Board and the Community Partnerships Board of the Australia Council for the Arts to produce a major exhibition project titled Edge of Elsewhere.

Report

Campbelltown Arts Centre will present the second installment of the three-year *Edge of Elsewhere* visual arts project from 15 January until 13 March 2011. Part of the official Sydney Festival program, *Edge of Elsewhere* was launched in January 2010 as a partnership between the two Sydney-based institutions that saw contemporary artists from Australia, Asia and the Pacific commissioned to create new works in partnership with Sydney communities.

The twelve artists who will exhibit work in the exhibition have each chosen to collaborate with a different local community throughout the Greater Sydney region in order to create their work. Visitors to Edge of Elsewhere in 2011 will be able to view works first commissioned in 2010 for the first time in the 2011 exhibition.

The artists exhibiting in *Edge of Elsewhere* are: Brook Andrew, Arahmaiani, Richard Bell, Dacchi Dang, Newell Harry, FX Harsono, Shigeyuki Kihara, Jun Nguyen-Hatsushiba, Lisa Reihana, Khaled Sabsabi, Phatawan Suwannakudt, Michel Tuffery and Young-Hae Chang Heavy Industries.

The exhibition will again be presented across two venues at Campbelltown Arts Centre and in Sydney's Chinatown, the home of 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art. A series of free shuttle buses will be scheduled on weekends between the two centres throughout January 2011, for the duration of the Sydney Festival.

New works that will be presented for the first time in 2011 include a series of large-scale still images by Melbourne-based Australian artist Brook Andrew that are the result of collaboration between the artist and Japanese anime cinema company Tokyo.Pop. Andrews is completing a residency in Western Sydney in order to create a short animation film that tells the story of the adventures of a young boy who grew up in that region. The animation stills will be presented in 2011, with the final film work to be presented in the 2012 exhibition.

Internationally renowned Seoul-based artist duo Young-Hae Chang Heavy Industries will present a new text work that incorporates music and images. The use of images is a first for the artist collective, as is the community engagement they will undergo to create the new work to be shown at Campbelltown Arts Centre and 4A. The artists will travel to Sydney in November 2010 to conduct a two-day workshop with local residents based around personal stories that will form the basis of the final artwork. The artists will teach participants how to use their stories to generate FLASH animations on computer screens.

Vietnamese artist Daachi Dang is working with the local Vietnamese community in Cabramatta in order to create a new three-channel video work that explores issues of migration, identity and memory. As part of this process, Daachi is conducting workshops in which local residents create hundreds of traditional Vietnamese paper boats that incorporate the stories of refugees and migrants. Daachi will then film a performance of these boats being launched into Sydney Harbour, to become part of the final artwork presented at Campbelltown Arts Centre.

Indonesian performance artist Arahmaiani, a female Muslim social activist, will explore issues around gender, religion and politics with her work for the exhibition. Arahmaiani, who represented Indonesia in at the 50th Venice Biennale in 2003, is working with a woman's group of Dutch East Indian heritage to create large-scale quilts that explore ideas of home.

Japanese and Samoan artist Shigeyuki Kihara, will present a performative poetry slam at Campbelltown Arts Centre. Kihara is working with established hiphop artists in a series of workshops in Campbelltown that will invite members of the public to express themselves through the spoken word. The artist is interested in connecting young people with their cultures and as part of this will organise trips to city museums and institutions to view traditional artefacts as a source of inspiration for the poetry 'riffing'.

Samoan-born and New Zealand-based artist Michel Tuffery will conduct a residency at Campbelltown Arts Centre working with local Pacific communities as part of his new work for *Edge of Elsewhere* inspired by the stories of German colonial heritage in Samoa. Tuffery will collaborate on a number of other projects for the Sydney Festival including Festival First Night for which he is creating a large-scale outdoor video projection work in partnership with Pacific communities in Campbelltown.

Sydney-based Australian artist Newell Harry will continue his work with local Pacific women's Tapa making groups in Western Sydney to create traditional tapa mats that incorporate anagrams, language and subverted traditional motifs. As part of this project Harry recently traveled to Tonga with one of the country's best-known hiphop artists Charles Lomu (known as 'Six Pound'). Lomu acted as cultural guide to Harry on the research trip that included meetings with elders and relatives of the Western Sydney Pacific women's group with whom Harry is collaborating.

No additional financial commitment is required by Council.

Purpose

To inform Council of the development of Campbelltown Arts Centre's 2011 Children's Theatre Program.

Report

The 2011 Theatre Program for children and young people includes exciting theatrical works designed for teenagers, children and their families. The program presents very different approaches to puppetry, narrative, audience interaction and the immersive use of contemporary technologies. Each work employs different strategies to engage children as they explore ideas, fears and stories through imaginative exploration and performance. The program ensures that opportunities for exposure to contemporary performance and theatre are available locally to all age groups. Performances are planned for April, June, September and November, sourced from exciting artists and major Australian companies and will include education support material, resources and post show forums.

The 2011 Children's Theatre Program continues and develops previous programming partnerships with Sydney Opera House and this year will include a work from renowned Scottish company Catherine Wheels. Campbelltown Arts Centre continues to partner with schools in presenting works to ensure that young from Campbelltown have access to national and international standard theatre experiences. The works presented in 2011 will include the following.

Saltbush

Saltbush is a journey through the culture and landscape of Aboriginal Australia. This interactive performance is the result of collaboration between acclaimed Italian theatre company TPO, Australian theatre director Jason Cross and Indigenous Australian artists. Sensor and infra red imaging technology allows children to interact, play and perform in the production and creates an immersive experience of the art work. The Campbelltown performances will be part of a 2011 national tour of *Saltbush*.

The Adventures of Alvin Sputnik: Deep Sea

The Adventures of Alvin Sputnik is from Western Australia's weeping Spoon Productions for young people and families from the age of 12 that will be presented on 14 and 15 June to schools, young adults and families. Set in a world where the seas have risen and humanity is under threat, science and humanity are turning to the oceans themselves. A last ditch effort to save the human race requires journeying down through the mysterious depths of the deep blue sea to find a new place for us to live. Alvin Sputnik has just lost his wife and accepts this perilous mission so that he may to follow her soul down to the underworld so that they can be together again once more. This award-winning one-man micro-epic puppet show melds technology and multimedia into a touching story of enduring love and the end of the world.

The Happiest Show on Earth

The Happiest Show on Earth is an engaging show for 4-8 year olds that will be presented to schools and families from 20-24 September. Created by South Australian company Patch Theatre as a contemporary version of nineteenth century medicine shows and featuring a cast of luminary Australian actors, this work includes Doctor Smith's little blue bottle of Magic, the Fabulous Flea Circus, the Sensational Sharp Shooting Carrots, the Bottled-Magic machine, the Hilarious Happ-o-Meter and Lighter-Than-Air-Levitation. Dorrie and Danny, a ventriloquist doll, save the day. An entertaining take on the world of the 'hard sell' and the idea that happiness rarely resides in the things that we buy

I, Bunyip is a new work from Sydney-based *erth* - Visual and Physical Inc, a visual and physical theatre company renowned for the creation theatre involving life sized interactive puppets. In the first week of November a season for schools will culminate with family performances for Fisher's Kids, in the premiere Australian tour of this new work. I, Bunyip introduce the names and forms of different spirit creatures from many Aboriginal language groups across Australia derived from years of research and visits to Aboriginal communities across the country.

The Ballad of *Pondlife McGurk*

The Ballad of Pondlife McGurk is a performance for children in schools aged 9-14, developed by Scotland's Catherine Wheels Company that will be presented at Sydney Opera House in November 2011. A limited tour that includes Campbelltown Arts Centre is currently being finalised.

Campbelltown Arts Centre is currently in discussions to develop a major three year partnership with Sydney Opera House to develop, produce and tour new children's theatre works. This partnership will assist Campbelltown Arts Centre to make a substantial contribution to Children's theatre development in Australia while providing a high quality and accessible theatre program for children and families in Campbelltown.

Council was also advised that the Arts Centre would seek further funding from external organisations including Landcom to deliver MINTO: LIVE.

Report

Landcom has advised that they will provide \$25,000 support toward MINTO: LIVE and will join other government partners in the delivery of the event. These partners include Housing NSW, Working Together in Minto, Australia Council for the Arts, Arts NSW and Rydges Campbelltown.

MINTO: LIVE is a large-scale site-specific performance event presented as part of Sydney Festival, January 2011 in Minto. The event will bring together national and international artists to work in collaboration with the residents of Minto to create eight new performance works that reflect and celebrate the stories and experiences of Minto residents.

The event will run for three days (21, 22 and 23 January) and will be presented in the form of a walking tour, with local volunteer tour-guides who accompany the audience through public and private housing estates to experience contemporary theatre, dance, film, music and song. The event will be staged each evening from 6 - 9pm in the centre of Minto, starting in the Minto Mall carpark and finishing in the newly constructed amphitheatre in Redfern Park.

MINTO: LIVE invites communities living in the local area to collaborate with professional artists and contribute to the making of a major community cultural event. It continues Campbelltown City Council's ongoing commitment to delivering an arts and cultural program in Minto that has meaning and relevance for its communities. MINTO: LIVE is reliant on active community engagement. The event empowers and activates local residents by utilising their skills and knowledge as experts of the local area. The vision for the event is live theatre and/or public artworks created and realised with local Minto residents in their neighbourhood and in some cases in their homes. Local residents will be involved in each stage of the creative process from consultation to performance.

MINTO: LIVE will be a free, accessible, all ages event held in the local neighbourhood. Campbelltown Arts Centre will advertise the event in the local media inviting locals to attend and support this unique and spectacular event. The event will be promoted through established community networks and printed material will be distributed broadly throughout Minto and Campbelltown. Participation as a performer or volunteer in the event is open to everyone. Campbelltown Arts Centre, in partnership with WTIM, St James Anglican Church and Burnside will distribute expressions of interest for community involvement. MINTO: LIVE will be an opportunity for the diverse communities living within Minto to collaborate with artists and with each other to realise this event.

MINTO: LIVE has been designed to ensure that the walking route of the event is wheelchair accessible and easy in scope to ensure that senior residents and children are able to actively participate. The audience for MINTO: LIVE will be comprised of the communities of South-Western Sydney, with secondary audiences representing metropolitan Sydney, the Illawarra and the Southern Highlands. MINTO: LIVE is the first event of its kind in NSW and Australia. The event brings together artists of the highest calibre to work in collaboration with local residents of Minto. It will be a celebratory and inclusive all ages event that includes inter-generational and inter-cultural performance works that capture and share local stories in a creative and innovative way. MINTO: LIVE provides professional and skills development opportunities for local residents MINTO: LIVE will attract a diverse audience, many of whom will be visiting the suburb for the first time.

8.3 Successful applications for the Sport and Recreation Facility grants program by Communities NSW, Sport and Recreation

Purpose

To inform the Sports Liaison Sub Committee of the six new grants projects that were successful in the programs being made available for sport and recreation purposes by Communities NSW, Sport and Recreation (formerly the NSW Department of Sport and Recreation).

History

Historically, the NSW Department of Sport and Recreation has administered the Capital Assistance and Regional Facility Grant programs each year, of which Council has been extremely successful in securing funding for sporting facility improvements.

A review has recently been conducted by the NSW Government into sport and recreation funding and changes have been made to consolidate their multiple grants programs.

In 2008-2009, Council was successful in receiving grant funding for three projects in the NSW Department of Sport and Recreation Capital Assistance Program. The Department has since restructured the program and have combined the previous Capital Assistance and Regional Facility Grants Programs.

The successful grants were reported to Council on 20 July 2010. The report is to update the committee that these projects will be scheduled in over the financial year.

Report

The Sport and Recreation Facility Grant program is open to incorporated community based notfor-profit organisations and Local Government Authorities. Grants up to \$200,000.00 are available to organisations for projects that will meet one or more of the following objectives:

- Increase regular and on-going participation opportunities in sport, recreation or structured physical activity in a sustainable manner;
- Improve access for people from groups that traditionally find it difficult to access sport;
- Improve safety at sport and recreation facilities;
- To develop environmentally sustainable sport and recreation facilities;
- Assist people from identified groups that face barriers to participating in sport and recreation.

The total cost to date of the successful projects under the 2009-2010 Sport and Recreation Facility Grants Program is \$174,000. Council's contribution to the projects is \$45,500 with the six clubs contributing \$45,500 and Sport and Recreation, Communities NSW providing \$83,000 in funding.

8.6 Campbelltown Athletics Centre – 2010 Summary

Purpose

To provide the Sports Liaison Sub Committee with a summary of the improvements undertaken at Campbelltown Athletics Centre in 2010.

History

Campbelltown Athletics Centre is an international standard athletics facility which caters for a wide range of events.

Report

2010 has seen a number of key improvements to Campbelltown Athletics Centre. In April the synthetic surface was totally resurfaced with great results. The feedback received from all users has been very positive. Grandstand seating from the old football Western Grandstand has been recycled and installed on the concrete seating area for spectators. 850 seats have been installed and have been a welcomed addition for all spectators.

New high jump and pole vault landing mats have been ordered to meet the needs of the facility. The original equipment which was purchased at the conclusion of the Sydney 2000 Olympics, had reached the end of its life. These are due to be delivered by mid October.

With financial; contribution from Campbelltown UWS Collegians Athletics Club, Council has been successful in receiving grant funding for the installation of shade structures throughout the facility. These will be installed early in 2011.

Campbelltown UWS Collegian Athletics Club continues to heavily utilise the facility. Currently the club has approximately 450 Little Athletics Registrations with up to 100 senior members. The Club utilises the facility on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday for training, with Tuesday and Friday for Senior and Junior competition respectively.

Purpose

To seek Council's approval to the Expression of Interest and selective tender for the replacement of fitness equipment at Eagle Vale Central and Macquarie Fields Indoor Sports Centre.

History

At its meeting of 22 August 2006 Council accepted a tender for the provision of fitness equipment as the original equipment had reached the end of its warranty period, was deemed unsuitable for use or was surplus to Council's requirements. A four year Service Agreement and Warranty was entered into with The Fitness Generation and expired on 30 September 2010.

Report

Fitness equipment at both Eagle Vale Central and Macquarie Fields Indoor Sports Centre have now reached the end of their four year Service Agreements and warranties and are due for replacement.

To allow the continual use of equipment that have expired service agreements and warranties can put in doubt the reliability and safety of the equipment. Ongoing maintenance would be required which can be expensive and repairs would be disruptive to the programs, which may potentially have an affect on Council income.

The tenders received in 2006 for the required equipment had a cost range of \$101,000 to \$250,000, therefore it would be expected that as a result of the EOI process Council would be required to advertise for public tender.

Due to the broad range and highly competitive market in the fitness industry and the types of equipment and technology that is available, Council is seeking to offer an Expression of Interest to reputable fitness organisations to review the equipment that Council currently has on site in line with Council's membership base. The interested organisations will submit to offer an expression to meet Council's needs over the next five years and to also give a cost estimate for the equipment upgrades.

As part of the Expression of Interest Council will request that organisations assess equipment suitable to remain in operation, design of floor space and itemise new equipment as well as the options of various payment methods. In the past Council opted for an internal lease agreement which was significantly cheaper than financing through an external provider. As part of the Expression of Interest assessment Council officers will review all criteria and proceed with a selective tender that provide the best overall outcome for Council.

ARTS CENTRE

Campbelltown Arts Centre Programs – Youth and ATSI

During this quarter Arts Centre staff developed and managed the following Youth and Indigenous programs.

Once Removed

Once Removed was an exhibition that refers to aspects of place and the predicament of displacement. It comprised an underwater reef made from sugar by Japanese-born artist Ken Yonetani, a compelling film installation by Aboriginal artist Vernon Ah Kee, and a five-metre video tower built by Claire Healy and Sean Cordeiro using 175,218 VHS tapes. This imposing stack of films ponders the passing of time, while Ah Kee's installation proposes an inclusive Indigenous presence in Australia's surfing and beach culture. Yonetani's project, in which coral shaped sculptures made from sugar are placed on a "reef" in the form of a Zen garden, explores the disjuncture between humankind and the natural world.

Curated by Felicity Fenner, Once Removed was commissioned for the 2009 Venice Biennale, the world's premier art event, to showcase a younger generation of Australian artists. Co-presented by the College of Fine Arts (COFA), University of New South Wales. The exhibition was presented at the Arts Centre from 22 May – 8 August.

NAISDA Residency Program – 'The Ink is Black, the Page is White #2'

Campbelltown Arts Centre in partnership with the National Aboriginal and Islander Skills Development Association Dance College (NAISDA), presented an Aboriginal community dance development project The Ink is Black, the Page is White #2 for Aboriginal dance students from secondary schools in South West Sydney. The project featured a workshops program and a performance showing.

The workshop program (26 - 30 July) provided school students with the opportunity to learn and develop new skills and new forms of both traditional and contemporary Indigenous dance practice. The school students worked with senior students from NAISDA, Australia's most acclaimed tertiary Indigenous dance training institution, and renowned Indigenous independent dance choreographer Vicki Van Hout.

The school students in collaboration with NAISDA students and staff then performed for elders, families, community representatives, and teachers to showcase the skills and dance work developed throughout the workshops program.

The performance showing on 30 July 2010 was based on the life stories of local Aboriginal Elders. The stories are taken from Campbelltown Arts Centre's community cultural development project, Tell Me My Mother and My Father My Brother which aims to promote learning, respect and understanding between generations.

The Ink is Black, the Page is White #2 follows the successful 2005 inaugural partnership initiative between Campbelltown Arts Centre and NAISDA, the 2007 project with NAISDA and acclaimed theatre director Wesley Enoch, the equally successful 2008 project with NAISDA and Indigenous theatre director Wayne Blair and last years The Ink is Black, the Page is White #1 with Vicki Van Hout.

Romaine Moreton Residency – One Billion Beats

In 100,000 years 2,500 generations of Indigenous people have walked this country now known as Australia. One billion beats refers to the heartbeats of one billion Indigenous people who lived before colonisation, weaving their stories through the landscape.

One Billion Beats is a multi-media theatrical collaboration between a spoken word artist, a playwright, vocalists, musicians, and filmmakers. One Billion Beats applies Indigenous storytelling to this multi-temporal theatrical work informed by ancient knowledge, philosophy, and spirituality. In this work spoken word poetry is intentionally reminiscent of oral storytelling tradition, engaging past and present at the junction where morality meets video art, music, and song.

The project blends a unique mix of vocal styles, audio visual beats, and physical movement to enter into a conversation between the body, technology, and place, coming together in an ancient contemporary blended multi-media theatre production.

In this first stage creative development (July and October 2010) poet Romaine Moreton and playwright Alana Valentine will develop texts for One Billion Beats in relation to ethnographic film footage from the National Film and Sound Archive. Using these texts, Romaine Moreton will work with Gambirri Illume to establish beats for performance of the texts.

Chiara Guidi: The art of play within contextual framework of the fairy tale

Over the last ten years Societas Raffaello Sanzio has been critically acclaimed as creating some of the more confronting and original theatrical work in the world. Under the direction of Chiara Guidi, company Raffaello Sanzio has created theatre both for and by children.

Through their Children's Theatre Experimental School, Raffaello Sanzio has established a unique methodology for creating both a space for children to learn the fundamental aspects and mechanics of theatre and also a place to create work that defies expectations of what children's theatre should look like.

Over two weeks from 20 September - 1 October Chiara Guidi led fifteen Australian theatre practitioners and an ensemble of local children. At Campbelltown Arts Centre the children learnt to explore, and investigate Chiara's process of making contemporary theatre for and by young people.

This Societas Raffaello Sanzio / Chiara Guidi project has been developed by Jeff Stein in collaboration with Jason Cross and produced by Campbelltown Arts Centre as a key project in the 2010 Performance Program. The services of Elio Gatti as full time interpreter have been provided through a partnership with Istituto Italiano di Cultura.

Saltbush

Saltbush is an interactive journey of discovery through Aboriginal culture, country, and spirituality. Two friends cross Australia on foot, through river country, an urban landscape, desert, and the sea. Their tale is told through dance, painting, music and stories created by Aboriginal artists.

Saltbush is performed on a touch sensitive carpet that responds to pressure with mesmerising projections and sounds, endlessly transforming and unfolding landscapes full of creatures and plants. Created in 2009 by Compagnia TPO and Come Out in co-production with Teatro Metatasio Stabile della Toscana (Italy/Australia), produced by INSITE ARTS

Two performances were held on Wednesday 20 October for primary school children, teachers, and families. Both performances were fully booked and were highly applauded.

The River Project

The River Project considers the Upper Georges River that runs through south west Sydney within the larger context of river systems of Asia and the Pacific by bringing together artists from Australia, China, India, Korea, Papua New Guinea, the Philippines and Vietnam whose work explores river systems. From the Yangtze, Mekong and Ganges to the Han, Sepik and Upper Georges, river systems reflect our interconnectedness, our fragility and our history.

The launch of The River Project included a traditional Maori blessing by Uncle Wally Ruha and a performance by Mana Wahine Aroha to launch the U-Turn/Restore Respect Waka Project by the Pacific communities of south west Sydney. Performances and Artist Talks by participating international artists were held on Saturday 28 August from 11am – 4pm. The exhibition was presented at the Arts Centre from 29 August – 24 October.

The River Project is produced by Campbelltown Arts Centre and is the key cultural and educational project of the Upper Georges River Catchment Urban Sustainability Initiative. The project is assisted by the Georges River Combined Councils Committee, NSW Environmental Trust and Arts NSW. The U-Turn/Restore Respect Waka Project is produced by South West Youth Peer Education Program (SWYPE), Mission Australia, and is supported by the Australian Government Attorney-General's Department, Campbelltown City Council and National Australia Bank.

Parliament NSW Aboriginal Art Prize

The Parliament of NSW Aboriginal Art Prize was established in 2005 and is developed in partnership between the Parliament of New South Wales and Campbelltown Arts Centre, and receives support from Arts NSW.

The Parliament of New South Wales Aboriginal Art Prize is awarded annually to an Aboriginal Artist who belongs to a NSW language group or was born in NSW and was on show at Parliament House from 29 September – 28 October 2010. The Prize has an award of \$20,000 and the winning work is acquisitive to the Parliament of New South Wales.

The 2010 winner was the Euraba artists and papermakers with their eight panel work *Gaduu* - *Murray cod* 2010. This is a collaborative work artists include: Thelma Bartman, Leonie Binge, Lola Binge, Michelle Binge, Adrienne Duncan, Alin Duncan, Aunty Joy Duncan, Christine Dumas, Nerida Hinch, Marlena Hinch, Aunty Marlene Hinch, Aunty May Hinch, Garry McGrady, Leah McGrady, Tim McIntosh, Stella O'Halloran, Anita Swan, and Lenice Swan.

In addition to the Parliament of NSW Indigenous Art Prize, there was a second award, the College of Fine Arts (COFA) Professional Development Award. The winner of this Award was Fabri Balckock for her Gupi Yungera (Possum skin cloak) 2010. The COFA Award provides Fabri with the opportunity to investigate a project during a residency that utilises COFA's arts and teaching resources that will culminate in a solo exhibition at COFA in 2011.

A regional tour of selected works from the 2010 finalists will be exhibited throughout 2011 at A WADJAR Gallery at Yarrawarra Aboriginal Corporation, Corindi Beach, Armidale and Region Aboriginal Cultural Centre and Keeping Place, Shoalhaven City Arts Centre, Griffith Regional Art Gallery. The regional tour is managed by Museums and Galleries New South Wales. A series of workshops to support the regional tour has been developed in partnership with Arts New South Wales, and the exhibition will also include an education resource.

Holiday and Term Workshop Programs

The Arts Centre continues to provide a diverse range of workshop programs throughout the year for both children and adults. During the July–September period the Term three, Winter and Spring Holiday programs were presented.

Council's fees and charges for the Leisure Centres identifies that the centres are closed for Christmas and Boxing Day each year. However Council at its meeting of 14 April 2009 resolved to open Campbelltown Swimming Centre and Macquarie Fields Swimming Centre on future Boxing Day public holidays on an alternate basis. Accordingly, Macquarie Fields Swimming Centre will reopen on Sunday 26 December 2010 at 9.30am.

Healthy Lifestyles records indicate that a small number of patrons use the centres on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve, therefore it is recommended that the centres close earlier on these days.

Last year Campbelltown Airds Indoor Sports Centre was closed for two weeks over the Christmas/New Year period due to recorded low attendance rates during this time. It is recommended that Campbelltown Airds Indoor Sports Centre again closes during this time in order to carry out additional routine maintenance.

Campbelltown Swimming Centre and Eagle Vale Central will operate under public holiday opening hours on Monday 27 and Tuesday 28 December 2010.
