## History

Council at its briefing of 27 March 2012 was advised of changes to the National Regulations and the National Quality Framework for the child care industry, which were implemented on 1 January 2012. In line with these changes the Childrens Services sector is now referred to as Education and Care Services.

## Report

Campbelltown City Council's Childrens Services is required to report to the Department of Education and Communities at a state level and is overseen by the Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority at a national level in relation to the National Quality Framework, Standards and Quality Rating program. The National Regulations and the National Quality Framework ensures all education and care services are working towards the same high quality standards and are covered by one single set of rules nationally.

The focus for the Childrens Services Section is on the delivery of better quality services and the promotion of good educational and social outcomes for children attending Council's services. It is suggested that in line with the new industry standards Council's Childrens Services Section name be changed to Education and Care Services.

## Purpose

To inform Council of plans to trial Orientation to Campbelltown Cultural Tours for new migrants.

## Report

Council's Community Resources and Development section has developed a partnership with the South Western Sydney Local Health District Multicultural Health Service and the Navitas Adult Migrant English Program in response to the lack of knowledge of services and facilities amongst students of the program.

This has led to the development of *Orientation to Campbelltown Cultural Tours* for residents from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds. The tours aim to introduce new migrants in the Campbelltown area to the services and facilities available from Campbelltown City Council. Many new residents come from countries with vastly different political and service systems and are unfamiliar with the way in which local government operates in Australia.

The tours have been booked for 1 May and 7 May 2012.

Tours will begin in the Council Chambers to give an overview of Council and a discussion on Waste Services. The tour will then visit Eagle Vale Central, the Animal Care Facility, Campbelltown Arts Centre, Quondong and the HJ Daley Library where staff will speak with the participants about the services. Further Council facilities will be highlighted out along the tour route.

A welcome pack will also be provided to attendees with information on Council's services and how to access translating and interpreting assistance at Council.

Further tours will be considered after a review of the pilot program.

## Purpose

To provide Council with an evaluation report on the 2012 Seniors Week celebrations held from 18-25 March.

## Report

This year's statewide theme for Seniors Week was *Live Life*, a theme continued on from the previous three years. Council, along with local community organisations, clubs and businesses, coordinated a diverse range of activities that encouraged the active involvement of older residents within the Campbelltown community.

The Campbelltown 2012 Seniors Week Calendar had a total of 32 events and activities during the month of March in the Campbelltown Local Government Area. All the events and activities held were free or low-cost to ensure they were accessible and affordable for local seniors.

Events promoted throughout Seniors Week 2012 provided the opportunity for local seniors to engage, make connections to other seniors and local services and businesses, learn something new and celebrate what it means to be a senior in Campbelltown and the contribution they make to the local area.

Seniors Week celebrations included the Jubilee Awards presentation at the Civic Centre on 13 March to recognise the contribution individuals have made to Campbelltown over the last fifty years.

#### Events held at Campbelltown Arts Centre

Events and activities at the Campbelltown Arts Centre included the *Life and Music of Winifred Atwell* presented by the humorous and interactive pianist Jan Preston. The performance combined live music, narration and visuals to celebrate the life and music of honky tonk great Winifred Atwell. Through her performance, Jan Preston gave a wonderful insight into Winifred Atwell's life; her tireless work for charities, her enormous success which culminated in her playing to more than 20 million people worldwide, and her many top ten hits. The free, ticketed event was very well received among audiences, with approximately 160 people attending.

The popular Seniors Soiree, an event which was first run in 2010, was attended by 80 people at close to full capacity on Saturday 24 March. The event provided individuals and community groups with the opportunity to showcase their skills and talents within a professional, curated performance environment. Performances were open to both beginners and professionals, and offered an encouraging platform for showcasing creativity. Thirteen individual and group performances were showcased throughout the afternoon, with approximately forty local participants. Trevar Langlands, President of 2MCR – Macarthur Community Radio, was host of the event.

The annual *Seniors Tea Dance* was held on Sunday 25 March. The event was attended by approximately 80 people. A key feature of the Tea Dance included participatory dance for those with partners and without, live music performed by The Penguins, and guidance from the event's MC, Captain Pat, from local radio station C913FM. The Tea Dance provided older citizens within the local community with an activity that increases social interaction, fitness and flexibility, and general well being through creative movement and dance.

A new program, The Tea Dance project, was launched during Seniors Week and will form part of the 2012 Contemporary Dance Program. Over forty participants of the Seniors Tea Dance registered their interest in engaging in this future project.

#### Other Council events

Council's coordination of three Seniors Concerts at clubs across the Campbelltown Local Government Area was extremely popular with approximately 1100 local seniors in attendance across the concerts which were held at the Campbelltown Catholic Club, the Campbelltown RSL Club and a concert at Western Suburbs Leagues Club.

Following the success of last year's concert, Western Suburbs Leagues Club in partnership with Campbelltown City Council again hosted a concert specifically for people with dementia and their carers. This concert was a very positive event, attracting over 100 attendees actively participating.

An estimated 200 local seniors attended the *The Good Old Days – Living Healthy for Less* event. Seniors participated in a variety of activities which included, community greening and permaculture workshops, pampering and jewellery making workshops, healthy eating cooking demonstrations and gentle exercise classes. Taste testing of various cultural foods was also offered with lunch and entertainment provided throughout the day. A diverse range of government and non-government organisations provided information stalls and resources. Those who attended the event also enjoyed the presentation and launch of the "Positive Ageing" calendar. Feedback received from participants showed how much they enjoyed the event. This was a great opportunity for local seniors, volunteers and services to work together and build partnerships to support each other.

Members of the Campbelltown Seniors Issues Group once again provided invaluable volunteer assistance at many events held during Seniors Week.

Healthy Lifestyles also offered free passes to Council's Leisure Centres across Seniors Week for local residents over 60 years of age.

#### Evaluation

Positive feedback regarding the organisation of the week has been received from attendees and participants.

This year's concert ticketing system proved a success, with more locations to access; seniors could receive their tickets from their local area. It also provided an opportunity for seniors to visit their local libraries and leisure centres to see what else is on offer throughout the Campbelltown LGA.

Positive feedback was also received after the Western Suburbs Leagues Club dementia specific, Campbelltown RSL and Campbelltown Catholic Club concerts, with various comments from seniors stating how well organised and how much Council's efforts were appreciated.

Evaluation surveys were sent to service providers and community members who attended local events to date, Council have received over a 25% completed survey response from the community and this feedback will be used in the planning of future Seniors Week events and activities.

All sponsors, volunteers and key stakeholders involved in the planning and coordination of Seniors Week 2012 will be sent a letter of thanks and certificate of appreciation.

#### Report

The Elders Olympics was held as part of Seniors Week celebrations at the Wollondilly Leisure Centre. Five teams participated in the Olympics, that saw Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people from across south west Sydney engage in friendly competition over a host of traditional games.

The aim of the event was to promote active and healthy lifestyles among senior members of the local Aboriginal population, and provide an opportunity to socialise and develop ongoing networks beyond the day.

Event sponsors and supporters of the Elders Olympics included, Sydney South West Area Health Service, Tharawal Aboriginal Corporation, Tharawal Local Aboriginal Local Land Council, Bankstown Area Multicultural Health, Muru Nanga Mai, Campbelltown Police Liaison Officers, Macarthur Disability Services, Campbelltown City Council, Camden Council, Wollondilly Shire Council, Wingecarribee Shire Council and NSW Government Communities, Sport and Recreation.

Tharawal Aboriginal Corporation Team Two, one of two Campbelltown teams participating in the Elders Olympics, claimed the winning Cup by a small margin following an outstanding performance. A joint Wingecarribee Shire and Camden Council team came second, and a joint team from Hoxton Park and Condell Park came third.

The event proved so successful and popular that discussions for next year's Elders Olympics are already underway.

#### Purpose

## Report

The Friends of Campbelltown Arts Centre Inc (Friends) is a well-established group that supports the cultural development of the Campbelltown region. Since 1982 the Friends have made significant contributions to Campbelltown Arts Centre through funds raised from their diverse events program. Such contributions include the purchase of furniture and equipment, artwork and the annual co-sponsorship of the Open Award of the Fisher's Ghost Art Award.

The Friends also continue to dedicate many volunteer hours into the operation of the Arts Centre. This ongoing support assists the Arts Centre to successfully meet the high level of administrative tasks required to deliver its dynamic artistic program.

This year is the 30th anniversary of the Friends formation and to celebrate this achievement the association has pledged a cash donation of \$10,000 for the purchase of a sculpture to be located within the Arts Centre's outdoor Sculpture Garden.

The sculpture would be a welcomed addition to the popular Sculpture Garden that was formally opened in 2001, as a Centenary of Federation project. It currently houses several significant sculptures by artists of national significance including the major commission *Tether of Time* by local artist, the late Joan Brassil.

## Purpose

To inform Council of Campbelltown Arts Centre's 2012 Contemporary Music Program.

## Report

The Campbelltown Arts Centre's 2012 Contemporary Music Program will continue to build upon the Centre's support for the development of new contemporary music works, education and community access. The program will feature newly commissioned works performed by Australia's finest performers and will continue to build the Centre's reputation for supporting the very best in contemporary music. The accessibility of the program is supported by ongoing audience development strategies that ensure that diverse sectors of the Campbelltown community have access to the program.

The program to date has included the following key projects.

## Daorum A Weekend of Creative Fire 25 and 26 February

The 2012 Contemporary Music program was launched with a weekend of fusion of two musical cultures. Daorum featured Korean pansori singer Bae il Dong, Kim Dong Won (voice and percussion), Phil Slater (trumpet),Carl Dewhurst (guitar), Matt McMahon (piano) and group founder and leader Simon Barker (drums) Drawing on selections from the pansori classics as vehicles for improvisation, Daorum incorporates Korean traditional rhythms and contemporary improvisation, creating a musical cultural exchange.

In addition to the musical performance, the Korean Cultural Office presented the award winning film "Intangible Asset Number 82", a feature documentary directed by Emma Franz that followed Simon Barker's search for an enigmatic Korean shaman. Korean pansori vocalist Bae II Dong also shared his wisdom and vocal art in a two hour workshop the following day.

The launch was well attended by local and Sydney audiences and representatives of funding bodies. Positive feedback was received regarding the inclusion of the film and the workshop in the program launch.

#### Prestidigitation Saturday March 17

In collaboration with New Music Network, Prestidigitation featured master multi-instrumentalist Adam Simmons and keyboardist Erik Griswold. In their first duo collaboration, Simmons and Griswold pooled their collections of toys, keyboards, found objects, reeds and flutes in an exploration of musical and colourful sound.

#### Kiddies Kushion Koncert Sunday March 18

The Fisher's Ghost Youth Orchestra performed at Campbelltown Arts Centre in a new toddlers' program for 2012. Aimed at children ages 2-5, the program was a fun opportunity to get up close to instruments and experience the sounds of a live orchestra in action. A full house of adults and toddlers ensured that this free community event was a huge success again. These concerts build relationships not only with the community of the Fisher's Ghost Youth Orchestra but the general community who are always appreciative of high quality free children's activities and experiences that can be shared inter-generationally.

#### Byron Watson in Recital Friday March 23

Byron Watson (Baritone) originally comes from Bradbury and is now an international opera singer and recitalist. He shared an exciting but accessible program of vocal music that was appreciated and enjoyed by a small audience. Byron was accompanied by acclaimed pianist and conductor, Simon Kenway.

As the relationship between Campbelltown Arts Centre and the Australian Opera has been developing, Simon Kenway has played an important role. This is the second time Kenway has worked at the Centre in the past 12 months and he will be leading vocal workshops on operatic choruses leading up to a performance at the Sydney Opera House for massed choirs including those from the Macarthur region, later in 2012.

#### Purpose

To provide Council with an update on the progress of the significance assessment for the Local Studies Collection.

## History

At its meeting on 10 May 2011, Council endorsed an application by the Library Service for a Community Heritage Grant to undertake a significance assessment of the Local Studies Collection. The Library's application was successful and the assessment has now been completed.

## Report

The significance assessment of the Local Studies Collection was undertaken by Dr Anne-Maree Whitaker, a highly regarded and experienced professional historian.

Dr Whitaker conducted her assessment of the collection during the early months of 2012 which included a number of inspection visits to the Local Studies Collection, and consultation with a range of stakeholders, including Campbelltown and Airds Historical Society, Library staff and a large number of researchers and casual users of the collection.

As a result of Dr Whitaker's review, the assessment found the Campbelltown Library Local Studies Collection has national significance. Areas of particularly high significance in the collection include the extensive scientific and environmental reports, oral histories, photographic collection, and the comprehensive local newspaper collection. One item assessed to have exceptional significance was papers and associated artworks of Steve Roach, considered to be one of the finest pencil artists Australia has produced which were acquired by the Library in 2007.

The report makes a number of recommendations for the collection's future use. It is anticipated that the report will assist in obtaining further grant funding for preservation and digitization projects.

## History

The Sydney Writers' Festival is Australia's largest annual celebration of literature and ideas.

Each year, over 300 events attract attendances of around 80,000 in venues that stretch from the Festival hub at Walsh Bay to the Blue Mountains.

For one week every May the Sydney Writers' Festival brings together authors of the very best contemporary fiction and writers of cutting edge nonfiction, including some of the world's leading public intellectuals, scientists and journalists.

## Report

Council's Library Service is again hosting a visiting author in conjunction with the Sydney Writers' Festival.

This year the top UK crime and thriller novelist, Peter James will discuss his latest offering in the Roy Grace detective series, *Not Dead Yet*.

The Roy Grace detective novels have sold over 11 million copies and been translated into 33 languages worldwide. When writing new stories, Peter carries out extensive research with Sussex Police and police around the world, observing their methodology to ensure his thrillers are as accurate, surprising and realistic as possible.

Peter James is one of the UK's most treasured crime and thriller novelists, an established film producer and script writer. Peter has produced numerous films. A TV adaptation of the Roy Grace series is currently in development, with Peter overseeing all aspects, including the script writing.

The author visit is free and will commence at 7:00pm at the Greg Percival Library and Community Centre on 16 May 2012.

#### ARTS CENTRE

#### Campbelltown Arts Centre Programs – Youth and ATSI

During this quarter Arts Centre staff developed and managed the following Youth and Indigenous programs.

#### Edge of Elsewhere

Edge of Elsewhere has been presented each year in January from 2010 - 2012. Part of Sydney Festival, *Edge of Elsewhere* has emerged from a strong history of community engaged practice that Campbelltown Arts Centre has developed through continuing to test new models of engagement between contemporary artists and communities. A primary benefit of the project model for *Edge of Elsewhere* has fostered emerging artistic talent within communities that will see the future emergence of artists who can sustain viable long-term and successful practices in national and international contexts. *Edge of Elsewhere* represents a commitment to sustainable audience development within communities for contemporary arts programs that will continue to see real benefits return to these communities, artists, arts workers and arts organisations, thereby promoting growth in these sectors. The 2012 exhibition included Aboriginal artists Brook Andrew and Richard Bell.

In his artwork, Brook Andrew worked in close partnership with the Hong Kong-based animation studio Imagi Studios, a leader in computer generated imagery (CGI) animated films, to produce a children's ghost story, *Banjo*, addressing issues of Aboriginal customs and histories of cultural disruption. The story of Banjo and his friends begins with the protagonist's journey in the setting of Western Sydney in the 1970s, travelling back in time to 1910 in Western New South Wales and Broome, Western Australia. The adventure follows Banjo and his dragonfly friend Ngalan on a tale through dreams and time. It is a story of love and sadness, filled with knowing animal spirits, historical truths, and a deep family secret, which spans oceans to an inland river and a gravesite.

#### Jack and the Beanstalk

In February 2012 Campbelltown Arts Centre produced the second stage creative development of *The Art of Play,* facilitated by Australian artist Jeff Stein and directed by acclaimed Italian theatre director Chiara Guidi. The project culminated in four performance showings of a new version of the English fairy tale Jack and the Beanstalk.

This project is the first international collaboration in the Contemporary Theatre Program. It is designed to develop a new theatre work for children that will premiere locally before touring nationally. Chiara Guidi is a sought after Italian director who pays particular attention to the power of sound and music in creating a space where children can feel, respond and act freely. Children learn the mechanics of theatre while responding imaginatively to all their senses.

#### Kiddie Kushion Concert

The Fisher's Ghost Youth Orchestra performed to Campbelltown Arts Centre in a new toddlers' program for 2012. Aimed at children aged two - five, the program was a fun opportunity to get up close to instruments and experience the sounds of a live orchestra in action. A full house of adults and toddlers ensured that this free community event was a huge success again. These concerts build relationships not only with the community of the Fishers Ghost Youth Orchestra but the general community who are always appreciative of high quality free children's activities and experiences that can be shared inter-generationally.

#### Holiday and Term Workshop Programs

The Arts Centre continues to provide a diverse range of workshop programs throughout the year for both children and adults. During the January school holidays a number of programs were presented.
