I refer to your letter concerning the issue of children falling from windows in high rise developments.

The tragic consequences of children falling from windows have been a subject of concern and attention to my Government and the Department of Planning & Infrastructure (the Department) since the release of the Outcomes Report on the subject by the Children's Hospital at Westmead in February 2011.

Among a series of recommendations the Outcomes Report made for both new and existing buildings, community education and awareness campaigns were identified as a priority action. International approaches to this matter have shown that such campaigns are a powerful tool in effecting change in the rate of falls and can be implemented without the need for time consuming regulatory change.

I was pleased to launch the first stage of the NSW Government's education and awareness campaign in November 2011 with my Ministerial colleagues for Health, the Hon Jillian Skinner MP, and Fair Trading, the Hon Anthony Roberts MP. This first stage has served to provide vital information to many parents through the distribution of posters and flyers to real estate agents, strata managers and community housing providers. The same material in an updated form, including versions translated into ten main community languages, has been released this summer as part of the Government's "Kids Don't Fly" child safety campaign. The material is available for download from a number of websites including the Department of Planning and Infrastructure and NSW Health. Subsequent stages of this campaign will seek to reinforce the message of the practical steps parents and carers can take to protect children from falls.

For new buildings, I am informed the Department has successfully lobbied the Australian Building Codes Board (ABCB) to have changes introduced in the Building Code of Australia (BCA) 2013 to require barriers to openable windows where a person could fall more than 2m. The new provisions will apply from 1 May 2013 with the implementation of BCA 2013.

Regarding your comment on the application of proposed changes to the Building Code of Australia to buildings approved or under construction, the Environmental Planning & Assessment legislation does not apply requirements proposed for a future BCA to buildings approved or under construction, giving proponents the necessary certainty in designing buildings to set requirements.

I thank you for your letter and support of Government action to date to address child falls from buildings. Children Falling From High Rise Developments

At a recent meeting of the full Council it was resolved that representation be made to your office on the matter of children falling from high level windows.

Campbelltown City Council notes recent media reports identifying an increase in the number of children falling from open windows in high rise developments and the tragic consequences to not only the child, but the wider effect such an incident has on the child's family and friends.

Council is also aware of (and fully supports) changes proposed to the Building Code of Australia (BCA) 2013 which will require barriers to openable windows in all new building work where a person could fall more than 2m. However, the Council is concerned that in the time it takes for the proposed changes to the BCA to come into effect, many more families will suffer from the consequences of children falling from high level windows that have no barriers. It is also of concern that the amendments to the BCA may only apply to new building works.

In this regard, Council seeks your advice on what measures the State Government is taking to prevent children from falling from high level windows in existing buildings, and what measures are being taken to ensure that buildings that are currently under construction and those that are currently being assessed or have been approved and are awaiting the commencement of construction, are not immune to the proposed changes to the BCA.

Council appreciates your consideration of this matter and fully supports any immediate and reasonable measures you may take in order to prevent further falling tragedies from happening again. Thank you for your correspondence of 21 December 2012 to the Minister for Health, the Hon Tanya Plibersek MP, regarding mental health funding for the Macarthur Region. The Minister has asked me to reply on her behalf.

The Australian Government has heard the views of Australians who have experienced mental illness, their families, their carers and the experts. In response to this demonstrated need, the Government has through the 2011-12 Budget developed the \$2.2 billion *Delivering National Mental Health Reform* package which will deliver cross-sector reform that recognises the diverse impact of mental illness throughout a person's lifetime. Further information about the package is at http://www.health.gov.au/internet/budget/publishing.nsf/Content/budget2011-minstatement.htm

A number of initiatives in this Budget package aim to rebalance the system to expand the focus of service provision to broader than just clinical care, and to better target and integrate service delivery. One such initiative is the Partners in Recovery (PIR): Coordinated Support and Flexible Funding for People with Severe, Persistent Mental Illness and Complex Care Needs initiative. Funding of \$549.8 million has been announced, over five years, to improve the system response to and outcomes for 24,000 people with severe, persistent mental illness and complex needs, and their carers and families. It is envisaged PIR Organisations in each Medicare Local region (including in the South Western Sydney region which includes Campbelltown) will start to come on board this financial year. Further information will be at www.health.gov.au/mentalhealth as it becomes available.

Another initiative as part of this Budget package is the allocation of \$197.3 million over five years to expand the *headspace* program. *headspace* provides a national coordinated focus on youth mental health, physical health, alcohol and other drug use, and social and vocational support. *headspace* aims to improve access for young people aged 12-25 years to appropriate services and supports better coordination between services. Funding for this program will result in 90 *headspace* sites across Australia by 2014-15 that, once fully established, will help up to 72,000 young people each year. There are currently 40 operational *headspace* sites across Australia.

headspace also operates eheadspace which provides free, confidential and anonymous telephone and web-based support services to young people between the ages of 12 and 25 years with, or at risk of developing, a mild to moderate mental illness.

You may also be interested to know about the Access to Allied Psychological Services (ATAPS) initiative. ATAPS, which is funded through Medicare Locals, enables General Practitioners to refer patients, including children, who have been diagnosed as having a common mental disorder of mild to moderate severity for up to 12, or in certain circumstances, 18 individual sessions of short-term focused psychological strategies services per calendar year with a mental health professional.

The Government through the *Delivering National Mental Health Reform* package will provide an additional \$205.9 million over five years to significantly expand the ATAPS program, to provide services to an additional 184,000 people in hard to reach groups, 50,000 children and their families, around 18,000 Indigenous Australians; and around 116,000 people from other hard to reach groups, with a particular focus on low socioeconomic areas.

The ATAPS program is funded through Medicare Locals Australia wide which act as fundholders for the program. The Department of Health and Ageing funds Medicare Locals to ensure the provision of ATAPS services can be achieved through a service model appropriate to local needs. Accordingly, it is the role of the Medicare Local to engage appropriately qualified ATAPS mental health professionals, in line with the local model of service provision, to provide the ATAPS services.
